

## How to include a Website in your Bibliography or Works Cited.

### Tips

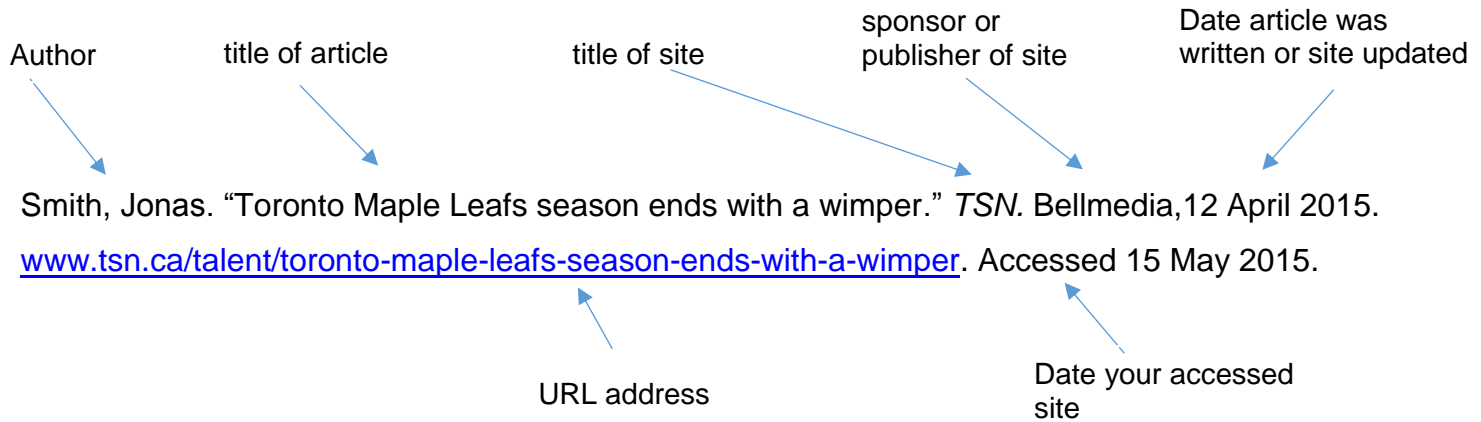
- Use the process of elimination – meaning, if you are missing information, leave it blank and go on to the next listing. For example, if no author is given, then the first thing you would list is the title of the article.
- If using the entire website, and no specific article, the first thing you would list is the title of the site.
- A DOI, or Digital Object Identifier, is a string of numbers, letters and symbols used to permanently identify an article or document and link to it on the web.

### Core elements needed in your citation

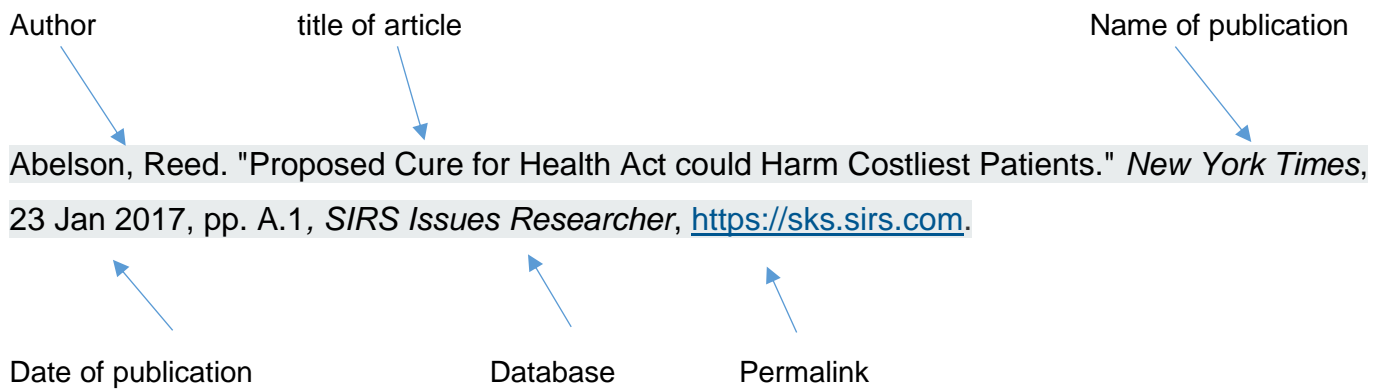
#### Use the following format, in the order shown

<b>Author.</b>	Last name, then first name, followed by a period
<b>"Title of the Article."</b>	In quotations, followed by a period
<b><i>Title of the Overall Web Site.</i></b>	In italics, followed by a period
<b>Publisher or Sponsor,</b>	Usually found at the very bottom of the site with the copy write symbol (followed by a comma)
<b>Date article was published.</b>	The date original article was published, <b>or</b> if using the entire site, then the date when the site was last updated
<b>Date of Access.</b>	Date you accessed the info, followed by a period
(Use one of the following) <b>URL or DOI or Permalink</b>	URL is the www address (do not use the http)  DOI it will start with a 10 and look something like this: 10.1000/182  A permalink is a www that is unlikely to change for years to come. An example is like the one provided by the database that we use at TLSS <a href="https://sks.sirs.com">https://sks.sirs.com</a> .
